String quartet ready to take up Plaza residency

EATONTON - The first of two performances to grace Eatonton and the Plaza Arts Center this fall featuring the Kazanetti String Quartet will be Saturday, Sept. 6.

The Atlanta-based group recently began its residency at the arts center, and is committed to bringing its love of music not only to the community but to Putnam County Schools as well.

Through a partnership with the school district, students at all three schools will meet the musicians and hear them perform prior to their scheduled concerts.

"This is the beginning of a relationship long-term between the school system and the quartet," said PCS Superintendent Jim Willis.

Willis, along with the board of education, are strategizing ways to strengthen students involvement in art and music.

Students need to learn reading, writing and arithmetic, but they also need to be exposed to art and music if

But continuing cuts to school systems' budgets are making if difficult for some districts to fund these programs, resulting in a lost of art or music in the classroom. Through its partnership

with the quartet, Willis hopes that each student in grades violin or violoncello.

"Kids in Putnam County deserve the same exposure to the arts that kids in Atlanta and Athens are getting," he said.

On Friday, Sept. 5 Kazanetti will perform for Putnam County Elementary School students, followed by a brown bag concert at the Plaza. Later that day, students from Putnam County Middle and High schools will attend the group's dress rehearsal at 1 p.m. at the arts center. The dress rehearsal is open to the public.

"We will be playing a variety of music, a little something for everyone," said violist Julie Rosseter-Sweeney.

Then on Saturday, Sept. 6 the group will host its first "musical petting zoo" in the lobby of the arts center at 6:30 p.m. According to Sweeney, kindergarten - 12th will have a the musical petting zoo allows chance to learn how to play a children not only a chance to see the instruments up close, but also try out their musical talents by playing the violin, viola and violoncello.

"We thought this would be a good way for Putnam County students to see, touch and play the instruments. We will do them before each concert this year," Sweeney said.
